With Easter fast approaching, the world is dominated by the invasion of Ukraine.

At the time of writing, (and I realise that this may be way out of date by Easter!) the humanitarian calls to provide safe corridors for civilians to escape bombardment are being ignored by constant and indiscriminate shelling. The money raised to help the refugees and those left behind has already exceeded £100m but many feel there is more we should be doing. There is clearly a need for delicate diplomacy, but each day brings more death and destruction and the threat that the Russian forces will simply "turn up the violence".

And we watch in awe at the bravery and sacrifice of Ukrainian civilians, taking on the most powerful modern army to defend their nation and their freedom, and increasingly, to defend Europe from what might then come. And we join with Russian and Ukrainian around the world, as well as in Russia to cry and pray and call on the Kremlin stop this unprovoked war.

The Easter story is about an individual, increasingly alone as his friends run away in fear; of empty and false accusations made against him to justify condemning him to death; of being handed over to the most powerful regime who liked nothing better than inflicting violence against those they perceived as weak and vulnerable ... followed by the most agonising execution devised by mankind. That was Good Friday. That was Jesus.

And they thought they'd won... until Easter Day when Jesus was seen again, alive. They knew he'd been dead... Roman executioners don't make mistakes! But here was something new, something miraculous, something more powerful than even death itself. Jesus was alive again, and even sceptics examining all the evidence and theories come to the conclusion that it must have happened.

The Christian church in Ukraine will be well aware of the parallels and know the promises that he will never leave them... that he will stand with them in the carnage, that he understands bravery and sacrifice in ways we will never understand. His Easter promise is that evil will not win, even though standing at the gates of hell is terrifying. He has been there already.

Maybe our support can include prayers too in the light of Easter... that Jesus death and resurrection can bring real hope into this dreadful situation, and somehow turn this around to a real and lasting peace.



As you are no doubt aware, this proposal has been shelved in its current form and cost.

We would like to thank those residents who completed and returned the survey form. The information contained within it will be very helpful. From initial findings it is clear that a new facility is needed but it should be smaller and cheaper options should be looked at. To this end, we are looking for villagers who would be happy to join a new working group to look at the options available. Please contact the Clerk if you would be interested in joining this.

Children's Play Area:

The parish council and members of the working group are working towards providing an exciting new Children's Play Area for the village and we are hoping that this will happening later in the year. In the meantime, we are delighted to say that a replacement zip wire is on order and should be in place for the summer.

We are now at the beginning of the new financial year. We have £10,000 in the community grants fund available to village clubs and community organisations which benefit the residents of Bishop's Itchington. Councillor Vacancies:

Unfortunately, it is with regret that we announce that Councillor Michael Mann has resigned from the parish council. We would like to thank him for all the hard work he undertook as the lead of the Pavilion Working Group. This means that we now have four vacancies for parish councillors.

If you would like to make a difference in your local community then maybe becoming a parish councillor is for you. The parish council currently has four vacancies for parish councillors and is looking for local people to join the team. If you are interested, please contact the Clerk for further details.

Quite a few of us attended a Federation Serious Science presentation in Learnington entitled "Climate Change - Is It Too Late?" But it didn't matter, there were still plenty of us there – fortunately we have an above average membership for a village. And we also welcomed some visitors who we hope will soon become members.

A WALK AROUND THE CEMETERY : PHILIP ROLAND JONES



On entering the Cemetery, walk past the Chapel, and count 14 rows along and then turn left. The first grave is the last resting place of Philip Roland Jones. Philip was born in Bishops Itchington on 6th November 1887, he was baptized on Christmas Day 1887 at the village church. Philip was the son of William Henry (born 1861) and Edith Rebecca (born 1859). Edith was born into a well-known family, the Suttaby's. Philip's siblings were Harry William born 1881, Constance born 1883, Leonard George 1885, Dorothy Maud 1890, Lily Verney 1891, Ada Gertrude 1893, Tessa Olive 1894 and Violet 1897. Violet passed away in June 1899, aged 1year 8 months. The family lived in Laurel Cottage, Gaydon Road.

When school teacher, Verney Blundell moved to Bishops Itchington from Gloucestershire she lodged with the Jones family for a few years, one of Philip's sibling was named after this school teacher.

In 1899, the children were playing in the garden when Dorothy (aged 10) found Violet, who was just under 2 years, lying in a tub of water. The tub was 13 inches high, 30 inches in diameter and was holding 7 inches of water. Philip managed to get Violet out of the water and he carried her into the house, by the time Dr Pirie had arrived Violet had passed away. Philip found two pieces of bread in the water and it is believed that Violet had been trying to get this bread. What a nasty shock for the family, it would be something that Philip and the family would never forget. Violet is buried in the village churchyard.

When Philip left school aged 12 years old he worked for a local farmer, but his main aim was to work with horses and this came about in 1901 when, aged 14, he became a stable boy to one of large stables within the village.

WALK AROUND THE CEMETERY : PHILIP ROLAND JONES

Andrew Gladstone Clark was the owner of Plough Farm, now Elms Farm, Plough Lane. Some of the lads and men who worked on the farms left when they got married to work at the Cement Works where the money was better. Fathers would know when they would get home after working a 12 hour day, they would grow vegetables in the gardens, no lawns and flowers beds like today, every spare piece of garden would be used to grow food and chicken and ducks ran around and, if they were lucky, some may even have a pig.

By the time Philip was 16 he would have been able to join the Greaves Club, everyone had to have two sponsors to join. The younger members of the village would become members so they could play on the billiard table, draughts or dominoes, darts etc. On pay day, with the pennies they would have left after giving their board and tally money to their mothers or fathers, these young ones could buy themselves a mineral water or glass of homemade lemonade which would have been made by the steward's wife or helper.

Money would always be short in any family, most had to use the tallymen who came around the villages selling their wares - clothing, shoes, material etc., so housewives could make items. Each tallymen would arrive on the same day and collect their weekly payment. When the wife had paid for a few times, she would buy more items to be added to the balance. These men could get anything for you, expect Philip may have used these tallymen when he first started working for Mr Clark so that he had the correct clothing for a stable boy. At Plough Farm, each boy had his own stables to clean out plus on each door was that stable broom, when someone left the stable boy would get promotion to groom, this was an important job, the horses had to be ready to hunt, go to race meeting, point to point etc., Philip would have worked with about six other grooms, namely Douglas Soden, Thomas Clemence, Philip Parish, William Beaney, Jack Taylor plus Walter Mann (who was left the farms and land which Andrew Clark owned when he died). Andrew Clark's will had a clause to say that Walter Mann had to carry on breeding racehorses, Walter Mann kept to this clause and bred many good racehorses at Manor Farm Stud.

Philip Roland was killed by a horse while working, he was aged 21 years. After Philip's accident his parents moved to live at 2 Moss Street Learnington Spa, never to return in life or death to the village.


