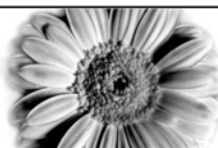

Bishops Itchington Memorial Hall

We are going through exciting times at the Memorial Hall. After several years of fundraising and planning, in the Spring of this year, we finally had sufficient funds to undertake Phase 1 of the refurbishment of the Memorial Hall.

This is the most extensive part of the refurbishment and has, to a large degree, been driven by the fact that both the electrics and the gas central heating were beyond economic repair.

The work has focussed on the main hall of the building. We have new electrics, new heating, insulated walls and roof space as well as redecoration. I have been visiting the Hall regularly and have been truly amazed by the difference the work has made to its appearance. Another very important aspect of the work is the reduction in our carbon footprint. Hard to believe that we had a Hall with no insulation at all until this refurbishment!

In 1921 when the Hall was given to the village and dedicated to the memory of the fallen in the Great War, it was a very modern building. It was a place where the community could come together and support each other after that War.

We are so proud that as a result of the hard work of the Committee (both past and present members) over the last 6 years, together, with some support from the Parish Council, we have been able to complete a huge part of the refurbishment.

The 8th of August is the date that we are working towards to show off our Hall.

The event will start at 2 pm. It will be a simple affair - a bit of a relaxed garden party. Details will be posted on Notice Boards etc., around the village, so do keep a look out.

Please come along. The pandemic has been so hard for so many, with few families left untouched. It will be so good to celebrate the re-dedication and re-opening of our Hall which is after all at the centre of our Village.

Along with all our regular patrons, it would be good to see people who have been connected with the village for a long time as well as people new to the village. I'm sure it would be most heart-warming to see our whole village community coming together, old and new, young and mature alike in celebrating the beginning of the end of the ordeal we've been through this last year and a half.

Bishops Itchington's War Memorial Hall Magnificent Gift to the Village

Friday last was a memorable day in the history of Bishops Itchington, marked by the opening of a new Memorial Hall – a magnificent and practical gift to the village from the Lakin Family.

The proceedings commenced with a memorial service in the Parish Church at 7 pm which, despite the heavy downpour of rain, was filled to overflowing. During the assembling of the congregation, a number of appropriate voluntaries were played by Mr H Packer, Organist.

The service, which was of a most impressive character, was taken by the Vicar (the Rev. Audrey Irving, M.A.). The service opened with the hymn "For all the Saints", followed by special prayers and collects. The 23rd psalm was sung to Boyton Smith's setting in A followed by a Lesson taken from the Book of Wisdom, 3rd Chapter, verses 1 to 6, followed by the hymn "Ten Thousand Times Ten Thousand".

The address was delivered by the Rev. Harold Gibb of Barford (it is worth recording here a brief note of the somewhat remarkable career of Mr Gibb who served through South African war as a chaplain and served in the same capacity in the European war, later taking a commission in a cavalry regiment with whom he saw much service. It is sad to relate that he is totally blind, having lost his sight in the war). Mr Gibb, during his address, laid special stress upon the example of sacrifice that the Memorial Hall and Tablet stood for, more especially to our children of the present generation and those who would come after us. The service closed with Hymn 274 accompanied by the band.

A procession was then formed up in the following order and marched to the Memorial Hall for the opening and unveiling ceremony:- the band, surplice choir and clergy, the ex-service men of the village, the Bishops Itchington troop of Girl Guides under the command of Capt. Irving and Leut. Noon, followed by the general public. The dedication service at the Hall was conducted by the Vicar, during which hymns nos. 165 and 232 were sung accompanied by the band. Appropriate speeches were delivered by Sir Michael Lakin, Bart. and Brigadier – General Pitman.

Sir Michael spoke in warm terms of the entire absence of strikes and industrial unrest in the district and of the very cordial relations existing between all present and himself and his family and he trusted that the same would continue for all time. He hoped good and full use would be made of the hall and trusted that it would be found to be a practical asset to the village.

Brigadier General Pitman then made a short speech in which he said he hoped the building would prove of useful service.

Sir Michael Lakin then called upon Brigadier General Pitman (his son-in-law) to unveil the Memorial Tablet. This was followed by the singing of hymn 232 accompanied by the band and the sounding of the Last Post and Reveille brought the proceedings to a close.

The Tablet is fixed on the north-east wall of the front vestibule entrance. Previous to the ceremony, wreaths and flowers were placed at the foot of the Tablet by relatives and friends of the fallen. A large laurel wreath was sent by Messrs. Greaves, Bull and Lakin Ltd. Wreaths were also sent by:- Mr and Mrs Richard Lakin and family (Lighthorne), Mr and Mrs H G Lakin and family (Pipers Hill).

The Tablet, which is of copper bronze, was designed and made by Messrs. H B Sale Ltd, Birmingham and is inscribed as follows:-

“This hall was erected in memory of the men of this village who gave their lives for their country in the Great War, 1914-1918: Pte. John Beesley, Canadian Infantry; Tpr. Wilfred Blackham, 21st Lancers; Corpl. John Coleman, F.F.A.; Pte. Joseph Gubbins; Rifle Brigade; Pte. William Higgeson, R.D.C.; Pte. Alfred Henry Holder, Border Regiment; Second-Lieut. Edward Holland, Scots Guards; Pte. James Humphries, R.M.L.I.; Stoker Reuben Mann, H.M.S. Hawke; Pte. John Morgan, R.W.R.; Gunner Lewis Randell, R.F.A.; Lce.-Corpl Algernon Sheasby, Oxford and Bucks; Pte. John Sheasby, R.W.R.; Sapper Frank Soden, R.E.; Pte. Frank Thacker, West Kents; Drummer Thomas Thacker, R.W.R.; Pte. Ernest Timms, Labour Corp.; Seaman Horace White, H.M.S. Orvieto.”

The hall is built of stucco freed cellular concrete blocks, designed and built by Messrs. Wilson, Lovatt & sons Ltd, Wolverhampton and consists of a main hall to seat 260 persons. There are committee and dressing rooms, ladies and gentlemen's cloakrooms, curator's room, kitchen, switch and motor – generator room, boiler house, cinema operating room, ticket office etc. The main hall can be used for cinema, concerts, stage plays, whist drives, dances and social gatherings. The hall can be hired for private parties etc.

A stage has been provided 30 ft. long by 15 ft. deep, with doors leading to dressing rooms. A fully equipped cinematograph has been installed above the front vestibule entrance.

On this floor are situated operating room, re-winding room and cinema stores. The projector is one of the well-known Moon's Crown Reflex type. The motor generator is installed outside the main building to eliminate all vibration and sound when running, so often apparent even in good class cinemas.

The hall is lighted by three handsome copper bronze electroliers and wall brackets to match; the usual theatre "dim lights" and cinema illuminated "exit" signs are fitted. Current is taken from Harbury Works Electricity Station by overhead transmission lines and underground cables. The electrical installation and cinema equipment was designed by Mr W R Taylor, electrical engineer at Harbury Works, and carried out by the works' electrical staff. The hall is fitted with panic doors and can be emptied in a few seconds. Fire risks are practically *nil*. A well-known cinema expert, during a recent visit, pronounced it to be one of the safest he had ever seen. His opinion has been endorsed by one of the leading fire office inspectors.

The building is heated on the central low pressure hot-water system, designed and erected by Messrs. Manley and Regulas Ltd, Wolverhampton.

PETTICOAT RULE FACES VILLAGE (Sunday Mercury 24th April 1949)



Bishops Itchington, Warwickshire's picture postcard village, is faced with petticoat government. Seven determined village housewives, dissatisfied with the handling of parochial affairs by their menfolk, are out to capture the council lock, stock and barrel at next month's parish council elections. And the village Hampdens who treated them as a joke a few days ago have had their morale shattered so badly that only two of them are offering resistance.

Whatever happens, the housewives must win 5 of the 7 seats and the men of the village fear they will take the lot.

Leading the fight is Mrs E Chapple-Higham, president of the Women's Institute in Bishops Itchington.

"Too Much Apathy"

"Women see matters in a different light from men", she told me last night. We have the feeling that we can do the job better and we are ready to prove it. There is too much apathy among the menfolk. We have to bear the brunt of village conditions. We want the chance to build the type of village we want."

Further down the village street, I found Mrs R Jenkins preparing a meal.

To her husband's bantering murmur of "nosy parkers", she retorted: "We haven't been nosy enough in the past. Now we are out to end all that."

101 Things

Another candidate, Mrs G Higginbottom, local secretary of the Women's Institute, told me: "We want a hundred and one things in the village. We need a policeman, better footpaths, proper sanitation and so on and it seems to me that the men will never get them for us. I'm a widow and I'm used to fighting for what I want."

I found Mrs H Payne carrying water into the house from a tap in the garden. She opened the door of the kitchen: "You see we have a sink but nobody can be bothered to pipe water from the garden to the kitchen. That's only one of the little things we women put up with. We are out to end all that."

I met with the same spirit from Mrs S Smith, Mrs J Robbins and Mrs F Morgan. Mrs Robbins told me: "It looks as if the men haven't the nerve to fight us. We hoped they would accept the challenge. As it is, it looks like it being a walk-over."

"We Asked For It"

Even Mr F Marlow, who has sat on the parish council for something like 20 years, had to agree with that. "We men should have made a better show on nomination day," he sighed, "It'll be a bad day if the women wear the trousers."

The only other male representative to face the women at the polls is retiring councillor Mr N Hunt. "I tried hard to persuade some of the men to put up for the council, but it was no use," he told me. "If we get petticoat government, then we asked for it."

But two males of Bishops Itchington had no misgivings about feminine rule. Commented the vicar, the Rev. C E Webb: "It cannot be denied that the men of the village are inclined to be apathetic. Our ladies are most progressive and such sensible folk." The clerk of the council, Mr H W Morgan, told me: "I'm impartial in this matter, but I must confess I suggested to the womenfolk some time ago that they should take an active interest in parish council affairs the result has exceeded all my expectations."

There would have been a third male entering the lists, but for the nomination of Mr J Major being received too late.

Councillor Vacancies:

Councillor Sharon Bougoussa has decided to stand down as a parish councillor. We would like to thank Sharon for all the hard work that she has undertaken on behalf of the village. The vacancy that her resignation has caused will be advertised in due course.

This means that, in total, we will have three vacancies for parish councillors.

- Anyone can become a parish councillor if you are aged 18 or over and are a British, or Commonwealth Citizen or Euronational Citizen. You will also need to be a registered local government elector for the area, or have been resident in the parish or within 4.8kms of the boundary for 12 months, or have worked in the village for at least 12 months,
- Councillors represent the local community, deliver services within the powers of the parish council to meet very local needs and work to improve the quality of life for residents of the parish.
- Activities include responding to planning applications, provision of facilities e.g. play equipment, providing grants to community groups etc.
- Councillors are expected to attend regular parish council meetings (usually second Monday of the month, with the exception of August), extra ordinary meetings of the council as and when required and the Annual Parish meeting.

Friends of the Yellow Land & BING

As the summer flowers reach their peak, the summer butterflies have their time – meadow browns, ringlets, gatekeepers and marbled whites. Also there are lots of damselflies and dragonflies winging their way through the sunshine.

A strange sight was reported further over on the nature reserve – hundreds of tiny froglets hopping their way, who knows where?

During the summer holidays there will be three family events on the Yellow Land. These are part of the activities being organised by the Community Centre and will include minibeast hunting, grasshoppers and crickets, renovating the bug hotel and butterflies.



A WALK AROUND THE CEMETERY : Reverend George Adney Irving

As you walk past the Chapel, you will come to a large tree on your left-hand side, walk across and you will find the memorial for Reverend George Adney Irving and his wife Annie Maria (nee Aston).

George was born in 1854 at Brynmawr Brecknockshire. His parents were Robert (born 1829 in Scotland), he was a draper and tea dealer and Mary Ann (born 1829 in Dowlais Glamorgan). Robert's siblings were Robert Hugh (born 1857), he was a school master and Martin Luther (born 1859), and he also took Holy Orders and was a missionary in what is now South Africa. Both were born in Brynmawr.

George left home aged 17, to become a boarder with Llewelyn Davis and his family in Brecknock. By the time he was 27, he had become a boarder with Elias Edwards's family. Elias was a local Baptist, tailor and draper, at this time George was a student at Oxford University. George was a non-collegiate student at the Oxford University gaining a Bachelor of Art (BA) in 1884 and Master of Art (MA) in 1887. In June 1885, Lord Bishop of St Asaph, Joshua Hughes, an Anglican diocese in Wales, ordained George Adney Irving to the curacy of St Deiniol Worthenbury in Wales.

On 15th September 1885 he married Annie Maria Aston (nee Havard) in Bedford. Annie had first married Joseph Aston, but lost her husband. Once he had taken Holy Orders he moved around the country, first he ministered in Wales. By 1887, he was Reverend of St Andrews Church in Newcastle. It was while living in Newcastle their only child, Gladys Annie Maria, was born in 1887. From 1896 to 1910 George was working in the Diocese of Worcester, at All Saints and was Chaplain of H.M. Prisons.

In January 1911, George had arrived in Bishops Itchington, the Archdeacon of Coventry, Dr Arbuthnot, conducted the service. The family soon settled into the Vicarage, becoming part of village life, George helped run rummage sales to help fund Churchwardens expenses, he also helped at St John Ambulance Association, he was chairman of the Parish Room Committee. Gladys, his daughter belonged to The Girls Friendly Society, which both her parents were involved with often inviting them for tea in the vicarage. George became County Council school manager.

A WALK AROUND THE CEMETERY : Reverend George Adney Irving

One of his special days were Empire Day, George would plan the day with the churchwardens and head of school, the children were given lessons on the Empire in the morning and patriotic songs were sung, in the afternoon sports were held following a tea in the school rooms. The brass band paraded around the village, many of the houses had home-made flags hung from windows.

The sinking of HMS Titanic in the night of 14th /15th April 1912 brought sadness to all, as soon as the news was released George arranged a memorial Church service, those who could get to Church did, for this sad and solemn occasion, it was an impressive service ending with all singing 'Nearer my God to thee'.

Rev Irving saw his Parish through the Great War, giving comfort to the wives and parents of loved ones passed, fighting for our King and Country. Annie Maria Irving died of a seizure on 5th November 1913 she is buried in the Cemetery. George Adney Irving died after a long illness, often not being able to lead the service in Church, the Churchwardens called upon Rev. C Coe from Ladbroke and Rev. P W Daimpre of Harbury to help with Sunday services and for baptism, weddings, or funerals. On 30th March 1929, George Adney Irving was laid to rest beside his wife. The Bishop of Coventry, Dr Lisle Carr conducted a full choral service.

After George passed away the memorial stone was erected, on the top of the stone is the inscription

The beloved vicar of this Parish 19 years died 26/3/1929

'The triumph over death'

'The Resurrection

RIP.

Annie's name was engraved on the below memorial stone. Annie Maria Irving, wife of the above who entered rest 5/11/1913 died age 63 buried 8/11/1913. Below her name followed: **On these souls sweet Jesus have Mercy. Eternal rest grant unto her and light perpetual shine upon her.**

In 1929 Reverend John Dobbryn came to the village. George's daughter Gladys stayed on for a couple of years then bought The Rookery, Priors Marston. She became a poultry farmer passing away in 1966. Most of the family are living in Wales.

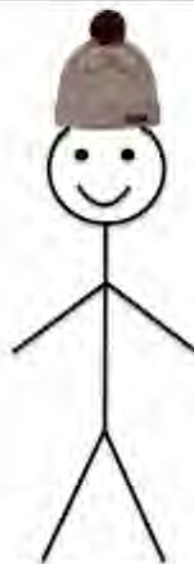

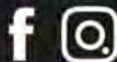
